Midweek Bible reading:

Ephesians 6:10-20

The armour of God

¹⁰ Finally, be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power. ¹¹ Put on the full armour of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes. ¹² For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. ¹³ Therefore put on the full armour of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. ¹⁴ Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled round your waist, with the

breastplate of righteousness in place, ¹⁵ and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. ¹⁶ In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. ¹⁷ Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

¹⁸ And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people. ¹⁹ Pray also for me, that whenever I speak, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel, ²⁰ for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it fearlessly, as I should.

"...be strong in the Lord and in his mighty power"

Where does our strength come from? Is it something we generate by a series of disciplined religious practices? If we think that, then we are missing the main point that Paul is making. Paul is saying that our strength is the Lord – "be strong in the Lord".

Rather than trying to feel strong by anything we do, Paul is saying that God's amour itself is strong enough for us. The pieces of God's amour given to us are God's truth, God's righteousness, God's peace, the salvation that comes from God, and knowledge of God's word which is incisive.

Paul points out that living life well is a spiritual battle and that we will lose this battle against the most malignant force in the universe if we just rely on our own truth and righteousness, or on our own peace. Our own strength is just not enough. We are to stand, even after having done everything, because we stand in God.

We stand in God's amour. We simply place our faith in him. His truth and righteousness and the salvation Christ bought for us, protect us. We stand ready to share his gospel and to use God's word as the only offensive weapon that we are given.

For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints, and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart. (Hebrews 4:12)

And then there is prayer. To continue Paul's battlefield analogy, in any battle communications with the field commander are essential. We don't see the whole picture, but God does. Paul tells us that we can and should pray about anything at any time – "pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests"; praying "in the Spirit" because if we are Christians then we have been given the Spirit who knows us intimately and knows God's will perfectly. Communications "in the Spirit" are crystal clear, even if our words are hesitant and even confused.

Paul asks that we pray for God's people, because we are all in this battle together. Pray for help for God's people and for fearless courage to speak the gospel, at the right time and place, using exactly the right words.
